
Mary Knollys (and Edward?) (185?–187?)

The earliest certain resident of 7 Victoria Road (as the house was when built)¹ was **Mary Knollys**, who appears at this address in street directories for 1862 and 1867.² She may have moved in as early as 1856, and she remained no later than 1874. Also, by 1862 she was a widow, so it's impossible to be sure whether her husband ever lived in the house.

Mary had been born **Mary Bastard**, the daughter of James Stokes Bastard and his wife Mary (née Smith) and she was baptised in All Saints, Newcastle-upon-Tyne on 13th September 1813.³ James was an officer in the Royal Artillery, rising to the rank of Major-General.⁴ The 1851 census finds the family living in Woolwich, in a house on Kempt Terrace, which was opposite the Common (where Watling House and Siedle House are now on the A205).⁵

Five years later, on 27th August 1856, at the age of 43, Mary married **Edward Knollys** in St Luke's, the parish church of Charlton.⁶ The service was conducted by the groom's younger brother, Rev. Erskine Knollys. Mary's parents were by this time living nearby on Charlton Road (then called Blackheath Road), her father now a retired General, and no doubt she had been living there before the wedding.⁷

Edward had been born on 10th April 1810 and baptised on 11th May at St Mary, Ealing, the second son of William Knollys, titular 8th Earl of Banbury. ^{8,9} On 18th October 1827, at the age of seventeen, Edward purchased a commission as an Ensign in the 75th Regiment of Foot, and he was to remain with the regiment until his death. ^{10,11}

Edward Knollys's military career¹¹

Edward was a Freemason, joining the local lodge wherever he was stationed. The earliest membership records show him serving in Scotland (1844), Ireland (1846, 1847), and South Africa (1848).¹²

In 1849 the 75th Foot was posted to India, and Captain Edward Knollys landed in Calcutta with the regiment on 18th August that year. ¹³ The Freemasonry records show him active in Bengal and the Peshawar. However, early in 1856 he returned to England "for the recovery of his health", ¹⁴

and it was during this stay that he married Mary. At the time of the marriage he was a Brevet-Major, ¹⁵ and notice of the marriage was recorded in many newspapers: ¹⁶

Aug. 27, at Charlton, by the Rev. Erskine Knollys, Major Knollys, of the 75th Regt., to Mary, only daughter of Major General Bastard, Royal Artillery.


How soon after the wedding Edward returned to India is not clear, but on 2nd June 1857 he was promoted to Major, a promotion that would be implausible if he had not returned to the regiment.¹¹ He was therefore almost certainly present at the outbreak of the Indian Mutiny of 1857–1858.

It is doubtful whether he ever returned to England, and four years later, on 8th March 1861, at the age of 50 and with the rank now of Brevet Lieutenant-Colonel, he died of cholera in India.¹⁷

The following July the *Freemasons Magazine and Masonic Mirror* carried a fulsome tribute to him, which shows him to have been a very active member during his time in India, serving as Master in several lodges. It concluded that he was "a zealous, and distinguished Mason, a sincere friend, and a thoroughly good man".¹⁸

His will was proved in London three months later. ¹⁹ In addition to her husband's estate, Mary benefited from a rank-related Widow's Pension from the Army of £70 a year, paid quarterly. ^{20,21}




Register of Pension Payments to Mary, 1882

We can't know whether or not Edward and Mary moved into 7 Victoria Road on their marriage, but the alternative seems unlikely — that, after her husband's death, a childless widow would move to such a large house. That they had no children is not surprising considering Mary's age and Edward's return to India. However, without the 1861 Census, which has not survived for Charlton, we cannot tell exactly who else was living in the house with Mary. Evidence of later residents suggests a cook and a housemaid made up the usual complement of live-in servants at this period. While we do not know exactly when the house was built, there is a good chance that Edward and Mary were its first residents.

It's not clear exactly how long after 1867 Mary continued to live in Victoria Road, but by 1874 she had certainly moved, as the house had a new resident, Henry Bridges. ²² In the 1871 census the house is unoccupied, ²³ and Mary is listed at the home of Edward and Emma St Aubyn in Eaton Place, Knightsbridge. ²⁴ St Aubyn was 1st Baronet St Aubyn of St Michael's Mount, and Emma (née Knollys) was the older sister of Edward Knollys. ⁸ But Mary was a *visitor* in that household, not a *boarder*, so she had not necessarily moved from Victoria Road; she was simply paying a visit to her in-laws.

Later records show that Mary moved to an address given as "Fair lawn, Old Charlton" (the current road Fairlawn, though, did not exist at this date). 25 It was there that she died on $31^{\rm st}$ December 1883, age 70, leaving an estate worth £1,762. 26 On $4^{\rm th}$ January 1884 she was buried in Charlton Cemetery in the same grave as her father, who had died, age 88, twelve years earlier. 27,28
